### **PRESIDENT'S LETTER**

I hope each of you have had a wonderful holiday season and have fully recovered from your travels and visitors. Joy and I spent this past holiday season up north and it was really good to come back home.

I have tried to represent all of you fairly in dealing with the ongoing issues and concerns affecting Wedgefield. The year 2007 was a very productive year for the Wedgefield Plantation and for the Board. Some of the accomplishments that should be noted were:

1. The drainage culvert on Wedgefield Road (near Swamp Fox) was replaced and the road patched.
2. The trees on the Plantation were examined by a tree service and the scrub trees impinging on our Live Oaks were removed while other trees were pruned and cut back as needed to preserve our safety. The Plantation really looks good.
3. We are completing a feasibility study to examine the potential for building an office building to house our office and files. Our goal is to provide a safe and secure space for our secretary and the needs of the Board. We initiated the design work necessary to build an office building on the Plantation. It will be on Wraggs Ferry Road and will house our office with room for our monthly meetings. We will continue to hold our annual meetings offsite. Until then, Board meetings will be at the Georgetown Presbyterian Church on Black River Road. They will begin at 7:00 pm.
4. Work on the landing is proceeding. The existing float has been repaired and a contract was signed to repair the launching ramp. We also received bids to add a second float and to repair the north bulkhead at the entrance to the south canal. After due diligence, we decided not to repair the bulkhead since it really was not providing any useful function.
5. We completed revalidating the marina cards to update our list of users and to insure that only Wedgefield property owners have access to the marina.

6. The Board has continued to closely monitor the activity of the Golf Course owners relative to any change to the existing PUD. Letters have been written to the County Planning Office explaining our position and detailing the constraints of the PUD that governs the Wedgefield Plantation.

I know that we are all concerned about the final disposition of the golf course and the proposed changes alluded to by the owners. We will all have to wait and see just what they will actually be proposing.

The Wedgefield Board of Directors and the residents of Wedgefield absolutely oppose any action to change the existing PUD. Most of the current residents who purchased homes or lots in Wedgefield expected that the existing Planned Unit Development (PUD) would provide protection from unwanted future expansion. Our objective is to protect your interests in Wedgefield. We will keep you informed of any new developments.

## SAFETY

### ROADWAYS OF WEDGEFIELD PLANTATION

Wedgefield Plantation Association has signed an agreement with the Sheriff's Department, which grants the Department jurisdiction, to come into the Plantation for the purpose of enforcing traffic laws.

#### **Motor Vehicles – (Combustible or Electric)**

All persons who operate any Motor Vehicle on the roadways of Wedgefield Plantation **MUST** have a valid operator license.

Unlicensed and unregistered Motor Vehicles, with the exception of Golf Carts and maintenance type vehicles, lawn mower, tractor, etc., are **prohibited** from being operated on Wedgefield Plantation Association roadways.

#### GOLF CARTS

The Wedgefield Plantation Association Board (WPA) is renewing its efforts to provide a safe and legal environment for golf cart usage on the plantation. At present, the number of golf carts is increasing, and the potential for unwanted accidents is increasing as well. The rules for using golf carts are outlined in the Policy Manual under Safety (Current Membership Manual, pages 26-27).

The Wedgefield Plantation Association shall require each property owner/s, who allows their golf cart to be driven by either himself or herself, members of his/her family or guests, to sign a waiver of liability releasing the Wedgefield Plantation Association, its Board of Directors, and land employees from any and all liability for any injury suffered by the aforementioned individuals while (1) using or being on any road or property owned by Wedgefield Plantation Association, or (2) driving, riding, or otherwise using a motorized golf cart on Wedgefield Plantation Association roads and property.

Effective immediately, all owners whose golf cart is not registered with the WPA must do so at the WPA office. The effort involves signing the waiver of liability and obtaining a numbered Wedgefield sticker, which is to be affixed to the windshield of the golf cart. Owners having more than one golf cart must register each one in the same manner. Owners, who have already signed the waiver of liability form, must obtain the numbered Wedgefield sticker at the WPA office, and affix it to their golf cart windshield.



### ARC REPORT

Happy New Year to all of our property owners and members of the WPA! Since most of you do not get the opportunity to attend the General Membership meeting in November of every year, here's the data given at that meeting so you can see what your ARC committee has been up too for all of 2007.

The following actions took place by the ARC Committee:

- 4 New Home Approvals
- 4 Lot Clearing Approvals
- 6 Screen Porch Approvals
- 2 Sheds
- 1 Outbuilding Remodel
- 1 Front Porch New
- 1 Front Porch remodel
- 4 Home Extensions
- 2 Fences
- 1 In-Ground Pool
- 2 Metal Roofs

The ARC also recommended to the Board that there be a change in fees for **Trash/Damage Control** (refundable) as follows:

New Construction: from \$750.00 to \$1000.00

Major Renovations: from \$0.00 to \$250.00

Application Fee for Major Renovations: from \$10.00 to \$25.00

These Changes were approved by subsequent Board actions.

The ARC recommended the Board approve a Revised ARC Policy Manual with additions/corrections/deletions resulting from many hours of work by the members of the ARC Committee. The Board gave its approval at the September 2007 regular meeting.

Since that meeting, the ARC met and approved house plans for a second new home on Francis Parker. A tree removal project was approved for a home on John Greene, so were a child's play set and playhouse elsewhere in the community. (Even though these are considered by some to be temporary structures, the ARC procedures require the Association to be informed when structures of this type are placed on a property.)

My thanks to Committee members Jim Cavanaugh, Dan Longhi, Ed Tuttle, Bill Segelken, and Scott Marlowe (Alternate) for all their hard, thorough work over the last year.

## **PLEASE REVIEW**

### **COVENANT # 13:**

The grantor reserved unto itself, its successors and assigns, a perpetual, alienable and releasable easement right on, over and under the ground to erect, maintain and use electric and telephone poles, wires, cable, conduits, sewers, water mains and other suitable equipment for the conveyance and use of electricity, telephone equipment, gas, sewer, water or other public conveniences or utilities on in or over the rear ten (10) feet of each lot and ten (10) along (1) side of each lot and such other areas as are shown on the applicable

plat; provided, further, **that the grantor may cut drain ways for surface water wherever and whenever such action may appear to the grantor to be necessary in order to maintain reasonable standards of health, safety and appearance. These easements and rights expressly include the right to cut any trees, bushes or shrubbery, make any grading of the soil, or to take any other similar action** reasonably necessary to provide economical and safe utility installation and to maintain reasonable standards of health, safety and appearance. Such rights may be exercised by any licensee of the grantor, but this reservation shall not be considered an obligation of the grantor to provide or maintain any such utility or service.

### REAL ESTATE SIGN PLACEMENT

These are the terms and conditions relating to the placement of signs at Wedgefield:

- 1 One (1) sign may be placed on the front of the property and one (1) sign may be placed in the rear of the property, but no more than two (2) signs maximum.
2. Each sign shall be no larger than 18 X 24 inches.
3. Any sign in the front of the property must be set back at least 15 feet from the edge of the pavement.
4. Signs will be maintained in a manner such that the signs are not unsightly (hand lettered signs will not be approved).
5. Signs will be promptly removed when their function is complete.
6. Signs announcing real estate "Open House" may be placed on the property, in excess of those above, as long as they are placed and removed the same day as the "Open House". There may be no more than one, and they shall be no larger than 2 feet by 2 feet.



### PLEASE NOTE:

The drainage committee is grading ditches and cleaning out culverts. The contractors are doing work deemed necessary to the proper drainage in those areas. If any residents have any questions or concerns please contact the WPA office. Please don't express any complaints with contractors; they are doing work they were hired to do. After each area is complete we will move on to other areas. Please bear with us during construction.

## WOULD YOU KNOW IF YOU WERE HAVING A HEART ATTACK?

### ***Most Women Don't and What You Don't Know Could Kill You***

If you think you're too young for a heart attack, you need to confront the scary truth: Every year about 40,000

American women under age 55 are hospitalized for heart disease, and 16,000 of them die. What's more, younger women's heart attacks are fatal twice as often as men's. In fact, women who are 35 to 44 are the only Americans whose coronary heart disease mortality is rising (by 1.3 percent a year), according to a new study in the *Journal of the American College of Cardiology*.

Yet heart disease just isn't on most women's radar, even women who have risk factors that make this kind of health crisis much more likely. Our symptoms can also be so different from what we expect a heart attack to feel like that it's easy to miss what's really going on and delay getting medical care, which might be a deadly mistake. To have the best chance of survival and full recovery, treatment needs to start within 90 minutes of the onset of the attack.

#### **Taking the following six steps before the ambulance arrives could save your life.**

**One – KNOW THE SYMPTOMS:** A heart attack isn't always excruciatingly painful. A majority of and female heart attack survivors told University of Rochester researchers in a 2007 study that there was less discomfort than they would have expected. Women often don't have the classic symptoms, says Jennifer H. Mieres, M.D., director of nuclear cardiology and associate professor of medicine at New York University Medical Center. "Instead of chest pain, you may feel pressure, as if somebody were pushing on the inside of your chest, or you may have pain or unusual sensations somewhere other than your chest, such as your upper abdomen, the left side of your back, your shoulder; even your jaw," Dr. Mieres says. "One woman's teeth hurt and she had numbness in her mouth along with fullness in her chest. Some women also get a cold, clammy feeling or a sense that something's badly wrong. Or your only symptom may be unusual shortness of breath, so you're huffing and puffing during mild exertion that doesn't usually bother you, or feel that you can't get enough air."

Most younger women (55 or under) who have heart attacks don't recognize any of the warning signs, Yale University researchers reported in May. Many had so-called typical symptoms, such as sudden onset of fatigue, nausea and weakness, which are more likely to strike women than men. But even though 88 percent also had some chest pain, a leading heart attack

symptom in both sexes, only 42 percent thought it was their heart. Others blamed heartburn or indigestion, which feel similar. Recognizing symptoms that might be a heart attack—and realizing you could be vulnerable is key to survival.

**Two – CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY:** Say forcefully that you think you're having a heart attack. Don't worry about being wrong. There's a limited window of time to get the full benefit of such potentially lifesaving therapies as clot-busting drugs and balloon angioplasty (threading a balloon-tipped catheter through a vessel in your arm or leg to the blockage, then inflating the balloon to widen the clogged area). Sometimes a wire scaffold called a stent is also used to prop the vessel open. "If balloon angioplasty gets the artery open in the first hour after the heart attack, it can almost always prevent permanent heart damage," says Timothy D. Henry, M.D., director of research at the Minneapolis Heart Institute. "And if we can do it within 90 minutes of the onset of symptoms, that's usually fast enough to limit the severity of most heart attacks." Yet many women wait two or more hours. Bad move. "You risk your life by delaying," says Michael Cuffe, M.D., chief medical officer of the Duke University Health System. "Not only do your chances of sudden death go up, but even if you survive the attack, you could be left with such severe heart damage that it leads to death over the next six to 12 months"

**Three - CONSIDER ASPIRIN:** (maybe) Taking aspirin soon after a heart attack can significantly improve survival—but not always. Conditions that make even one aspirin risky? Stomach ulcers, being on blood-thinning drugs or, of course, an aspirin allergy. The 911 operator should ask about these and also try to determine whether your symptoms might signal a stroke. Aspirin can worsen the form of stroke triggered by ruptured blood vessel. Otherwise, an aspirin can help slow further buildup of the clot that causing the attack. Chew one standard-strength 325-mg aspirin tablet or an equivalent dose of Alka-Seltzer in water. Don't take coated aspirin, which acts more slowly, even when you chew it.

**Four - WAIT FOR THE AMBULANCE:** "About 5 percent of heart attack patients die before they get to the hospital because they develop abnormal heart rhythms, followed by cardiac arrest," Dr. Cuffe points out. "All too often we see spouses drive a loved one to the hospital only to have that happen in the car. After even a minute or two, the chances of reviving someone in cardiac arrest drop very rapidly, and after five to 10 minutes, survival rates are near zero." If your heart stops in an ambulance, however, paramedics can immediately use a defibrillator, which can shock it back into a healthy rhythm.



You'll also likely get faster treatment. A May 2007 study coauthored by Dr. Henry shows that arriving by ambulance can speed up "door-to-balloon angioplasty time" by up to 18 minutes, on average. Paramedics can do an EKG en route and alert ER doctors if you're having a heart attack, so they're ready to start artery-opening treatment immediately. On the way the crew can give you emergency medications, start an IV and monitor your heart rhythms. "The ambulance crew can already diagnose your condition before you get to the hospital," says Dr. Henry. "But this would not be true if you arrived by car."

**Five - DON'T GO ALONE:** Should symptoms hit when you're by yourself, 911 should always be your first call. After that, if possible, contact the family member, friend or neighbor who can get to your location fastest. Tell your helper immediately that you think you're having a heart attack and what your symptoms are. Also say where your insurance card and contact list are and that you've called an ambulance, and give the hospital you expect you'll go to. That way, if you later become too incapacitated to provide information to emergency responders, she or he can speak for you. Tell her to meet you at the hospital if the ambulance gets to you before she does. Then write down what you feel you have, get out your insurance cards and unlock your front door in case you lose consciousness. Loosen any tight clothing and sit or lie down in a comfortable position.

**Six - KNOW YOUR HOSPITALS:** An ambulance will normally take you to the closest hospital. But if there are several close by, the crew may agree to take you to the hospital of your choice if you offer a reason that makes medical sense – for example, your doctor practices there or has recommended it. The crew may be unable to comply if they are urgently needed for other calls. Or they may deem another center more appropriate, perhaps because it has a better emergency coronary program or because your condition is unstable and the safest option is to rush you to the nearest ER.

If you end at a hospital that's not in your insurance plan, it's unlikely an insurer would refuse to cover ER care for a possible heart attack or other urgent symptoms. If the hospital is out of network, however, you may have a higher co-payment.

Does it ever make sense to call the hospital of your choice for an ambulance? The answer is no, to avoid a potentially dangerous delay. Since hospitals don't dispatch ambulances, you'll just be told to contact 911, always your first call in an emergency. Don't call a private ambulance service-it may be slower and less well equipped and may not be well coordinated with the ER's cardiac team, Dr. Cuffe says.

**YOUR HEART ATTACK EMERGENCY KIT**

- \*Keep a bottle of uncoated aspirin in your medicine cabinet at all times.
  - \*Prepare a written contact list of family, friends and physicians. Post near home and office phones and keep a copy with your insurance card.
  - \*Program the numbers of your contact list on the speed dial of your home, office and cell phones.
  - \*Keep a pad and pen handy to write down your symptoms in case you become unable to speak.
  - \*Ask your doctor which hospital to use for emergencies and research the best cardio units near you.
  - \*If you're allergic to any drugs or have a chronic health issue, consider wearing a medical alert bracelet.
  - \*Know your insurance plan's rules for ER treatment, including those for using out-of-network hospitals.
