## New Villas Offer Plantation Living

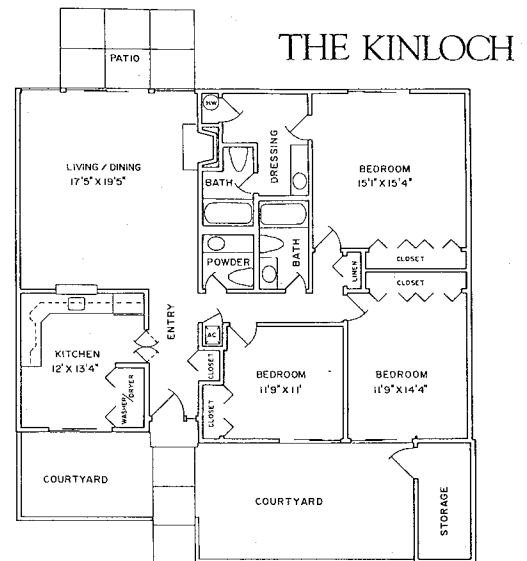
Gracious plantation living best describes the design concept of Wedgefield's newest villas.

Nestled alongside a quiet lagoon, these villas offer privacy yet are convenient to golf, tennis and swimming. Each offers spacious living areas, large kitchens, two or more bedrooms and baths plus a secluded terrace.

These 20 villas are now being built as an extension of the existing condominiums in Lafayette Village. Prices range from \$58,000 to \$85,000.

Three contemporary design concepts are available:

- "Windsor" - two bedrooms and two baths on one level.
- "Arundel" - two bedrooms with two and one-half baths on two levels.
- "Kinloch" - three bedrooms with two and one-half baths on one level.



"Each design is in response to the expressed interests of visitors to Wedgefield, those persons seeking plantation living at its best," explained Jack Kendree Sr., director of Wedgefield Plantation.

## Club Activities Schedule Fun

Wedgefield's social calendar begins with a gala dance on Saturday, May 19. Featuring the music of the popular Customs Four, the dance will be held at the Manor House from 8:30 until 12:30.

Development Month with special clinics for players 8 to 18.

In September, the first Wedgefield Club Championship will be held. Matches will be played over Labor Day Weekend. A Member-Guest Tournament will be sponsored by the club in October.

## “The Lion In Winter” To Be Presented

“The Lion In Winter”, a medieval comedy in two acts, will be presented under the stars at Wedgefield May 3 and 4.

A dinner-theatre production, the play will be performed by the Swamp Fox Players on the terrace lawn of the Manor House. Tickets for the 8 P. M. performance are \$12.50 per person. The cost includes cocktails, beginning at 6 P. M., and a full-course steak dinner served from 6:30 until 7:30 P. M.

The play, a meeting of the French and English Kings in 1183, is directed by Scott Maxwell and produced by Inge Ebert. Portraying leading characters in the play are John Temple as Henry II and Ann Israel as Eleanor of Aquitaine.

## Wedgefield's Serenity

Closely guarding the serene peacefulness that is Wedgefield is the plantation security force. Directed by Jim Gunter, the five-man force offers 24-hour protection to residents of Wedgefield. Each is distinguished at the Main Gate wearing the official Wedgefield guard uniform.

Protecting Wedgefield's 600 historical acres is no small task, says Gunter, an experienced security guard since his military days. “It's a pleasant job, though, because everyone is so friendly and cooperative.”

Not only does security offer a day and night patrol but also the responsibility of the guards to greet guests, take messages and packages at the gate house and to monitor traffic.

## Golf Course In Top Playing Condition

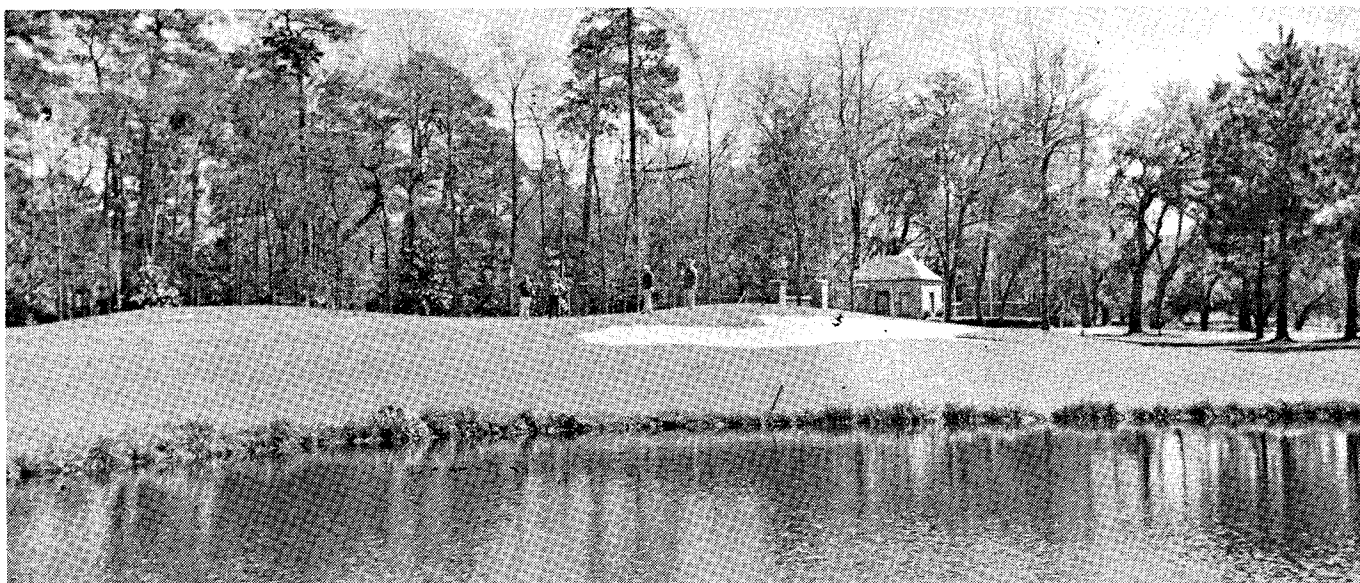
The winter maintenance program for Wedgefield's par 72 course has the fairways and greens in “tremendous playing condition”, according to Wedgefield Golf Professional Bobby Ford.

Beautiful golf fairways and plush greens are being enhanced by a tree transplanting program. Trees are being planted between number 17 green and number 18 tee, the seventeenth and eighteenth fairways, and

along the right side of the second fairway for a better definition of the fairway outline.

Wedgefield's water hazards and watering program will always be maintained at peak levels, even during dry seasons with the installation of a new pump, said Ford. The pump is located in the canal near number 16.

Many of the roughs and the cart path system have also been improved.

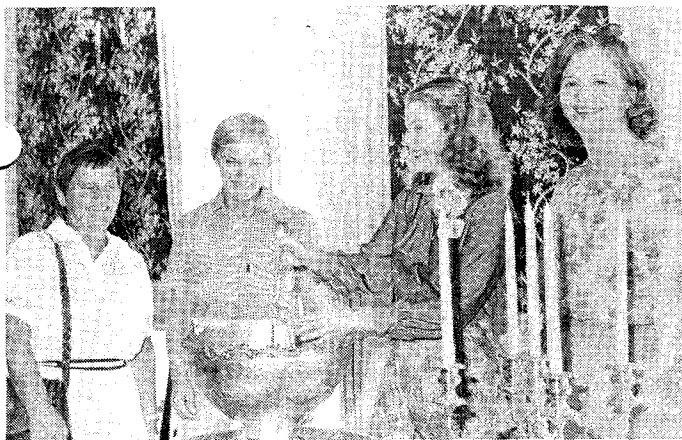

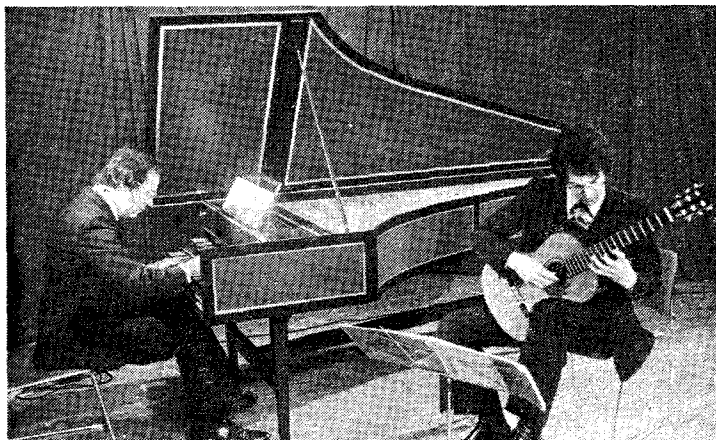
